Checklist

✓ Put yourself in control

Make use of the parental controls on your home broadband and any internet-enabled devices. You can find out how at your broadband provider's website or by visiting internet matters.org.

Search safely

Use safe search engines such as swiggle.org.uk or kids-search.com. Safe search settings can also be activated on Google and other search engines as well as YouTube. You can find out more at google. co.uk/safetycentre.

Agree boundaries

Be clear what your child can and can't do online - where they can use the intemet, how much time they can spend online, the sites they can visit and the type of information they can share. Agree with your child when they can have a mobile phone or tablet. Over 65 % of parents are most concerned about their 6-10 viewing inappropriate content online*



Explore together

The best way to find out what your child is doing online is to ask them to tell you about it. Encourage them to use devices in communal areas so you can see what sites they're visiting and share with them.

Check if it's suitable

The age ratings that come with games, apps, films and social networks are a good guide to whether they're suitable for your child. The minimum age limit is 13 for several social networking sites, including Facebook and Instagram.

TIPS

USE THE SAFETY SETTINGS

Most social media settings allow parents to set time limits, filter mature and or harmful content, and disable direct messaging with a passcode.

DISCUSS THE DANGERS OF OVERSHARING

Encourage your child to think before they say, do, like or post anything online. Explain that their 'digital footprint' shapes their online reputation.
